ADMISSION

Any student wishing to attend summer school who is not enrolled at WLU for the Spring Semester 2011 must complete an application for admission and must be admitted to the University before being permitted to register for classes. For admission forms and requirements, contact the Admission Office at 866-WESTLIB or 304-336-8076.

CANDIDATES FOR GRADUATION

All students who will complete their graduation requirements at the end of any summer session should report to the Office of the Registrar and complete the necessary application forms for graduation by May 27.

SUMMER ON-LINE REGISTRATION

Summer on-line registration via the West Liberty Informational Network System (WINS) will begin November 2. All students who are planning to attend any of the summer terms are encouraged to register during the period of November 1-12, 2010 since early registrants will have first choice of classes. However, students may register on-line up to the date listed below for each summer term. Prior to registering for courses, review the WLSC catalog to make sure you have met all course pre-requisites and course restrictions.

Summer I - May 9 (Late fee charged after May 10) Summer II -May 31 (Late fee charged after June 1)

Summer III -June 20 (Late fee charged after June 21)

To login to WINS, visit the WLU web site (www.westliberty.edu), on bottom menu bar, click on Wins. Click on Student Login under Secure Area. Enter Banner ID and Pin number, if you do not have this information, contact the Registrar's Office at #8007. After logging in, click on Student Services, then click on Registration. Click on Register or Add/Drop classes, then select appropriate summer term, submit and enter CRN number for course(s). When finished entering CRN(s), submit changes. Return to Registration menu, click on Student Schedule and print a copy for your records. The Registrar's Office will not issue printed copies of schedules. The Business Office will send billing invoices prior to the summer term beginning.

TUITION FEES & EXPENSES

Students attending summer school will pay tuition, registration, and fees at the following rate for each summer session:

Undergraduate In-State: \$203.33 per credit hour

Out-of-State: \$531.25 per credit hour Metro Rate - \$425.00

GRADUATE TUITION

IN-STATE - \$261.11 per credit hour; OUT-OF-STATE - \$351.11 per credit hour

West Liberty University is required by the Board of Directors to collect all tuition and fee payments in advance at the beginning of each summer term. In cases where a payment plan has been approved, failure to complete payment by the date designated shall result in immediate cancellation of all course registrations for the current semester or summer term. In such cases, the student will owe the portion of the tuition and fees and room and board charges that are appropriate for the portion of the semester or summer term for which the student was registered for classes. For example, if a student is given permission to pay on the third day of a regular summer term and then is required to leave school because of non-payment, that student will owe 10% of the tuition and fees for the term and for three days of room and board. In such cases, students will not be permitted to register for further courses until the financial obligation has been paid in full. Additionally, the college will withhold all grades and transcripts until such time as the financial obligation is paid. The University may turn delinquent accounts over to a collection agency which results in an added charge to be paid by the student. Registration is not completed until a check covering payment of tuition, residence hall rent, board and fees has cleared the bank upon which it was drawn. Students not paying by the due date, will be assessed a \$80.00 fee. A returned check charge of \$25.00 will be assessed on each check returned for "insufficient funds" unless the student can obtain an admission of error on the part of the bank. The Business Office shall declare the fees unpaid and registration canceled until the check has been redeemed and the additional charge paid. Student records will not be released by the Registrar's Office for any student who has a delinquent financial obligation to the University.

No breakage deposit is required in any course, but students will be charged for breakage or damage to equipment. Students should also be aware that additional lab fees are assessed for certain courses.

The college and its governing board reserve the right to change rates for tuition, fees, room and board with suitable notice.

PARKING

Parking fees of \$10.00 will be charged for all students attending classes on the Main Campus.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Aminimum of ten persons must enroll in a course and be in attendance at the first class meeting in order to have the course offered. A lower enrollment will cause the course to be canceled, in which case a full refund will be issued.

Failure To Attend The First Scheduled Meeting Of Your Classes May Result In The Loss Of Your Position In Those Classes Unless You Have Notified The Instructor Prior To The First Meeting That You Will Not Be In Attendance. Furthermore, All Attendance Policies Go Into Effect Upon The First Meeting Of A Class.

TUITION REFUND POLICY

Astudent who withdraws from college by following the proper procedure will be issued a refund of tuition and fees through the Business Office upon receipt of an official "cancellation of Registration Form." Students who officially withdraw from a portion of their courses during the refund period must request a refund from the Business Office. Refunds for reduced course loads are not made automatically, only upon formal request by the student. Refunds are automatically computed only for students who withdraw from all courses during the refund period. A student who is required to withdraw for disciplinary reasons shall not be entitled to a refund. Refunds are calculated from the first full day of classes.

CONTINUING STUDENTS: Except for first-time enrollees, students who officially withdraw during a summer term shall receive a refund of regular fees in accordance with the following schedule:

FIRST-TIME ENROLLEES: Students who officially withdraw before or during the first period of enrollment at West Liberty University shall have their refund calculated as follows, in accordance with the provisions contained in the Federal Higher Education Act.

Refunded fees must be returned in accordance with the requirements of the Higher Education Act whenever Title IV funds are involved.

[Allow approximately five weeks for refunds.]

CREDIT

Students will be limited to a maximum scholastic load of six semester hours during each summer term. All courses will meet five days a week unless otherwise noted on the class schedule.

Applications to carry a course overload should be made to the Office of the College Dean at least two weeks in advance of registration day. Students on probation should ordinarily limit their credit load during the summer terms. Students should limit their credit load for all sessions to a maximum of 18 semester hours.

FINANCIAL AID

Financial aid is awarded to eligible applicants on a funds-available basis. Summer financial applications are available in the Financial Aid Office, Room 157, Main Hall.

VETERANS

Students who will be attending summer school under Veterans' Benefits must be certified to the Veterans Administration by the University. Information concerning VA benefits and certification may be obtained by contacting the Veterans Clerk at 336-8007.

FINAL GRADES

Students will view final grades electronically through WINS (West Liberty Network System). Grade reports are not mailed to students.
