

Homecoming 2012 was a perfect fall weekend, with the football team topping it off by defeating Shepherd University in a thrilling game and winning the Black and Blue Presidents Trophy, a rivalry tradition begun by President Robin C. Capehart and Shepherd University President Suzanne Shipley in 2011 to spur school spirit.

Riley Lynn Bonar, a junior elementary education major and Billy Castilow, a sophomore criminal justice major, both from Wheeling, were crowned Queen and King. Former alumni homecoming queens Ingrid Loy (1995) and Christine Warco (1997) presented a new \$250 scholarship to Bonar as part of halftime festivities.

The Alumni Association honored alumni, Jack Adams '63, Joan Campbell '62 and Dr. Melvin Sorkowitz '62, adding their names to its Wall of Honor.

Adams was born in Washington, Pa. and is now a resident of McMurray, Pa. After graduating from WLU with a bachelor's degree in marketing, he began his successful career in business with Retail Credit Co. (Equifax). In 1967, he began a 30-year career with Exxon Company. Retiring from Exxon in 1996, Adams became president of SJR's Team Supreme,

Inc., which became a nationally recognized leader in Exxon convenience store marketing. After 13 years, he retired in 2009. He was a founding brother of the Delta Omega chapter of Delta Sigma Pi **International Business Fraternity** that started the sale of West Liberty logo merchandise. A member of the Gary E. West College of Business Advisory Board, he is chairman of the College of Business alumni campaign, former board member of the Alumni Association and treasurer for the Pittsburgh Chapter of the Alumni Association.

Campbell was born in Wheeling and is a resident of Clearview. She graduated from Warwood High School as valedictorian and went on to earn a bachelor's degree at WLU, where she once again was selected as valedictorian. She then earned a master's degree at West Virginia University. She went on to an outstanding career of 30 years as an educator in Ohio County Schools. Married to President emeritus Clyde Campbell, she is a beloved First Lady (1984-1995) and initiated a number of collegewide programs including: campus beautification projects, a May breakfast for graduating females, a holiday party for campus sororities and recognition dinners for student groups such as theater, music and

athletics. She was advisor to her sorority, Alpha Xi Delta and is a lifetime member of the Alumni Association, a member of both the President's Circle and the Nathan Shotwell Society.

Sorkowitz was born in Akron, Ohio and now resides in Boca Raton, Fla. He earned his bachelor's degree at WLU and earned a master's degree in audiology at the University of Wisconsin, where he was a scholarship recipient. He also attended Louisiana State University and Temple University, earning a doctoral degree in audiology. He is the former director and founder of the audiology program at the Albert Einstein Medical Center, Phila. He incorporated Audiological Consultants, Inc. of Pennsylvania in 1969 and in 1972 made a movie, "Hearing Aids, How to Fit Them," winning an award for the most important contribution to medicine and surgery through the field of cinematography. Sorkowitz became a national lecturer for hearing aid manufacturers and otolaryngologists. The Audiology Foundation of America honored him with the Professional Leadership Award in 2003.

SCIENCE RESEARCH GAINS /// COMPANY COM

Biology Professor Dr. Joseph Horzempa has received \$500,000 in grants to study a bacterium as vaccine host. "The grants will allow me and my students to progress in our study of Francisella tularensis with the hope of learning more about its use with vaccines," Horzempa said. The funding came from the National Institutes of Health and WV-INBRE (Idea Network of Biomedical Research Excellence).

Horzempa first became interested in this bacterium during his time as a post-doctoral research scientist at the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine in 2006. Horzempa was the first person to discover that the bacterium could invade human red blood cells, a significant find since scientists know of only a handful of bacteria that can do so.

"Patients immunized with this organism show a very long-term memory response — over 30 years post vaccination," he said. "Based on the fact that this is such a potent vaccine, we propose to use this organism as a novel vaccine platform."

Horzempa's research laboratory is a busy place with nine students working under his direction. He also employs two paid research assistants, Deanna Schmitt, Ph.D., postdoctoral research associate and Brianna Cowan, research technician.





FOOTBALL

Coach Roger Waialae's football team authored one of NCAA Division II's best turnaround stories of the year by bouncing back from an injury-riddled 1-10 season in 2011 to post Waialae's seventh winning season in eight years with a 6-5 mark. Included in those six wins was a pair of thrilling one-point victories at Russek Field against regionally-ranked Shepherd and UNC-Pembroke. A total of 11 Hilltoppers received All-WVIAC recognition with three defensive stars — Marco Ricchetti, Leonidas Redding and Justin Black — earning first-team berths.

TENNS

Coach Heather Gallagher's regionally-ranked women's tennis team went 13-2 and advanced to the WVIAC championship match for the second consecutive season. Lauren Howard was the WVIAC Player of the Year while Raissa Wischi was a first-team All-WVIAC selection for the third straight season.





VOLLEYBALL

West Liberty's 14 wins under first-year coach Kayla Fetsko were the most for a WLU volleyball team in more than a decade. Anne Edwards earned All-WVIAC honors while Courtney Pyeritz was named to the WVIAC All-Freshman Team.

SOCCER

Coach Barry Christmas's women's soccer team enjoyed a season of "firsts" in the debut season for West Liberty's newest sport. Among those "firsts" were the team's first win, a 2-1 victory at LaRoche (Pa.), and the first WVIAC win, a 3-1 romp at Seton Hill. Paige Petroval even claimed the first WVIAC Player of the Week Award.

The ASRC is rocking again this winter as Coach Jim Crutchfield's two-time defending NCAA Division II Atlantic Region champion Hilltoppers opened the 2012-13 season at No. 1 in every national poll.

The lofty national ranking comes as no surprise to West Liberty fans as Crutchfield returned his top eight scorers from last year's 32-3 juggernaut, which led the nation in scoring for the sixth time in the last seven seasons en route to its third straight WVIAC title.

West Liberty – a sizzling 64-2 in league play over the past three years – was No. 3 in last season's final Top 25 after finishing the 2011 campaign as a unanimous No. 1 pick.

When West Liberty, Kentucky, was struck by a powerful tornado on March 2, 2012, WLU was in the midst of basketball tournament action in Charleston, W.Va. But the story of another West Liberty, devastated by a violent storm, inspired President Robin Capehart to ask Jeff Knierim, Vice President of Community Engagement, to find a way the Hilltoppers could aid our newly discovered "sister city."

According to news reports winds peaked around 140 mph, leaving a path of destruction that left five dead and a disaster scene so dangerous, police had to close off access to downtown. WLU responded with a team of 33 students and 11 employees

traveling to our sister city over spring break to help. This fall the service project continued and WLU gathered another mission team that continued the recovery efforts.

WLU students also held fundraisers to defray the cost of the fall trip and after covering expenses, the mission team donated \$1,000 to our "sister city."

"It's incredible to see the damage and destruction caused by this tornado. Our students and employees stepped up and made a real difference," said Knierim. Rev. Debra Dague, protestant campus ministry, also coordinated the mission trips.

Campbell Hall of Health Sciences is rapidly taking shape on the Hilltop and makes it easy to see the growth and vitality of campus. In fact, this fall semester saw the largest fall enrollment since 1973 and the seventh year in a row for an increase, according to Scott Cook, dean of enrollment.

ADVANCEMENT GAME PLAN

When President Robin C. Capehart announced the capital campaign during Homecoming Weekend 2012, he delighted sports fans as he also introduced consultant Ed Pastilong to the Hilltop.

The director of athletics at West Virginia University from 1989-2010, Pastilong is now assisting campaign coordinator and Development Director Angela Zambito Hill and Vice President of Institutional Advancement Jason Koegler in their fundraising efforts.

A Moundsville native, Pastilong spearheaded WVU's growth into one of the nation's finest intercollegiate athletic programs during his tenure with the Mountaineers.


"As a visionary and successful athletic director, we could find no one better than Ed. Our students will benefit from

his involvement and I thank him for his willingness to share his talents with us," Zambito Hill said. He is focusing on athletic fundraising.

At the time of his departure from WVU, Pastilong had one of the longest-serving tenures of any athletic director at a BCS-level school.

During his tenure, he directed more than \$65 million in facility renovations, witnessed the athletic department's budget increase from \$20 million to more than \$50 million, steered WVU into the Big East football conference in 1991 and full-fledged member status in the league in 1995, the school's first-ever association in a major athletic conference.

The facility upgrades and capital improvements were termed staggering by WVU's communications office at



the time of Pastilong's induction into its 2012 Hall of Fame. Other facility improvements under Pastilong's tenure include renovations to the WVU Coliseum and Hawley Field and the construction of Dick Dlesk Soccer Stadium, Cary Gym for Mountaineer Gymnastics, a state-of-the-art wrestling facility and a basketball practice facility.

Pastilong joined the WVU athletic department as football recruiting coordinator in 1976 and two years later became its scholarship officer. In 1979, he was named assistant athletic director for facilities and operations. He remained director of athletic facilities until his promotion to associate athletic director in 1987. For the last two years, he has served as director of athletics emeritus at WVU.


