




Photo 2: Argigento




Photo 10: Mask

was an exercise in adaptability.






Photo 14: Sagrada Familia

This photo, taken on a recent trip to Seville, Spain shows the life giving force of water. It also shows the essence of Spanish culture through the colors of the wall and fountain.




Photo 17: Watercolor Studies of watercolor showing nature.
